Suggestions for

Supervising Young Children

It is important (and sometimes a challenge!) to:

1. Always keep your child within sight and hearing distance by planning <u>ahead.</u>

- 2. Make it a goal to <u>always make a quick scan</u> for potential objects or situations that are near and could harm your child.
- When you allow your child to play outdoors, practice being <u>aware of the</u> <u>outside environment</u>, just as you did indoors.
- **4.** Make it a priority to **<u>put barriers around potential dangers</u>**, such as radiators, stairs, open windows, chemicals, drugs, and matches.
- Children are curious so it is important to <u>have door locks, or door</u> <u>catchers on cabinets</u> out of reach of young children.
- 6. Parents will want to <u>have a specific plan for firearms</u> in the home. Gun experts view gunlocks as an absolute necessity.
- 7. Parents find it important to <u>choose age appropriate friends</u> as well as <u>age appropriate toys or equipment.</u>
- 8. Parents who have to leave the home to use the phone need a special <u>plan</u> to supervise the children during phone calls.
- 9. Parents find it helpful to **confirm baby-sitting arrangements,** and make sure the sitter has emergency numbers.
- **10.** Parents with even a small substance abuse problem should <u>have a plan</u> to keep substance use from threatening their children's safety.
